

| Title                                      | Description   |
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| 2017 Feeding Toolkit Workshop              | The 2017 Feeding Toolkit will be covered with emphasis on the inventory and reporting requirements related to service delivery. Accurate reporting is critical to our ability to plan, maintain adequate supplies, and report our services. Session is appropriate for feeding, ERV, and shelter personnel.   |
| 6409 Drill                                 | In this drill participants will practice filling out Form 6409 the Red Cross Requisition Form for goods on a Disaster Relief Operation. We will do a short overview and refresher and then will practice fillout the forms and look at how the requisitions are filled by the Logistics team. This drill is appropriate for anyone in a supervisory role and anyone who is interested in learning how to order things on a Disaster Relief Operation.                       |
| Born on the Battlefield                    | This course is designed to introduce participants to the role of the American Red Cross as part of a worldwide network dedicated to the relief of suffering.  |
| Bulk Distribution Operations               | The purpose of this course is to prepare participants for the tasks and responsibilities in setting up, operating and supporting Bulk Distribution on a local response and disaster relief operation.   |
| Capitol Mall Evening Walk                  | You've driven a ways to get here? Been sitting in class? Let's take a walk and see the Oregon Capitol Mall under the lights and take a look at several new monuments. This is an opportunity for individuals who would like to take walk to get out into the evening air. To include the Oregon State Capitol (outdoor view), Law Enforcement Memorial, and the Oregon WWII Memorial.   |
| Care Assistant Training Skills Test        | The purpose of this course is to prepare disaster responders and partners to safely assist people with Disabilities and other Access and Functional needs access and utilize Red Cross facilities and services while promoting the independence of the clients served. This course will not take the entire time and will vary based on the testing environment; individuals will need to take Care Assistant Fundamentals online before they can complete the skills test. |
| Casework: Follow-Up & Supervisory Workshop | This course will focus on the follow-up casework after the initial DAT course and will then go into supervisory aspects of casework. This workshop will be helpful to both new and experienced DAT workers and will help give a better understanding of casework after the initial DAT call.  |
| Casework: Interviewing Skills Drill        | This course will focus on the interviewing and documenting aspects of the casework that are required of DAT Workers. This course is designed for both new and experienced workers and has tips and reminders to help improve casework.  |
| Collaborating Essentials                   | Collaborating Essentials is a basic level, instructor-led course designed to promote and support collaboration at the Red Cross. Participants will engage in discussions and scenarios to determine the different skills and behaviors required for building and maintaining internal and external relationships. The course emphasizes the role that collaboration plays in the successful delivery of disaster services.  |

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| Concept of Operations Workshop             | In this workshop we will explore the Disaster Cycle Services Concept of Operations which was published November 2014. As part of that discussion we will delve into further detail on ICS, incident action planning, and situation reporting. The entire workshop will offer an insight into how the meetings/reporting/products are developed and distributed on a disaster. It is highly recommended that you take the ICS workshop prior to this workshop.  |
| DAT Workshop & Form Introduction           | In this workshop we will explore a variety of DAT responses and discuss interviewing techniques to help ensure we capture all necessary client information effectively. We will offer tips and examples of strong narrative writing, assistance justification, building a recovery plan, and case reviews.   |
| Defensive Driving                          | This course is designed to teach driving safety and is taught to all Red Cross staff and volunteers who drive Red Cross vehicles; It is required for anyone that will or may in the future drive a Red Cross vehicle (including rentals). It is highly recommended that all volunteers take this course.   |
| Deployment Panel                           | The Deployment Panel shares tips and experiences to help make disaster workers successful on their job assignment, acknowledging that no two disasters are alike, there are things tha responders can do ahead of time to help make their deployment more comfortable. The panel will consist of individuals who have been deployed in the last year and will also share some tips regarding the difference between a national and local deployment.   |
| Disaster Academy Photo                     | Plan your day so that you make sure that you are in our 5th Annual Disaster Academy Photo outside of Cone Chapel immediately following Session #2.   |
| Disaster Assessment Update & Skills        | This course will give an update on Disaster Assessment and walk through changes and check for understanding regarding assessments and technological components of RC View, Survey 123 and other options for Disaster Assessment. Pre-requisite- Disaster Assessment Fundamentals   |
| Disaster Cycle Services 2017 Update        | This is a re-teaching of the Thursday evening course for those that were not able to make it to the event. It's time to get all of your updates for 2017. This session includes updates on multiple topics and includes Everyone is Welcome, RC View, ConOps & Readiness Update. Everyone is highly encouraged to attend this session.   |
| Disaster Cycle Services Activity Faire     | Welcome to the Disaster Academy! Join us to learn more about the different activities available in the American Red Cross and catch up with your fellow volunteers. This is an opportunity to meet people, get invovled, talk to people who have deployed in the activities andshare a snack as we kick off a great weekend of training.   |
| Disaster Frontline Supervisor & Simulation | Disaster Frontline Supervisor (DFS) is an instructor-led, basic level course. The Disaster Frontline Supervisor Handbook provides disaster relief operations supervisors with tools that support their success. The handbook is for use on operations and in the classroom. You will receive a link to the handbook to use in the course. Disaster Frontline Supervisor Simulation (DFSS) is an instructor-led, basic level course. The simulation builds on the information presented in the Disaster Frontline Supervisor (DFS) course. The simulation provides participants an opportunity to practice key supervisory skills and use the Disaster Frontline Supervisor Handbook as a resource. |

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| Disaster Health Services Team Meeting     | This meeting provides an opportunity for Disaster Health Services members to come together to discuss pertinent information, new protocols, items of interest, and to network with each other.  |
| Disaster Mental Health Fundamentals       | The purpose of the course is to prepare licensed mental health professionals to provide for and respond to the psychological needs of people throughout the disaster cycle of preparedness, response and recovery.  |
| Disaster Mental Health Management         | The purpose of this course is to train DMH leaders on the proper use of DRO forms, implementing and using PsyStart data and best practices for structuring the DMH portion of a disaster response and to provide participants with an inside look at the services Disaster Mental Health management best practices.   |
| Disaster Mental Health Team Meeting       | This meeting provides an opportunity for Disaster Mental Health Services members to come together to discuss pertinent information, new protocols, items of interest, and to network with each other.   |
| Disaster Services Technology 101 (Part 1) | This course is part one of two. The second half of the course will conclude on Sunday morning from 9:15am - 12:15pm. Disaster Services Technology will be an in class presentation of the class that are traditionally offered online. This is an opportunity for individuals to take the course in person with an instructor in the room and also at a faster pace. The online webinars are scheduled for two hours per segments and the in person course allows the each session to be one hour. In this session the participants will take the first four segments of the course work. |
| Disaster Services Technology 101 (Part 2) | This course is part two of two. The first half of the course will be held on Saturday afternoon from 1:15-5:15pm. Disaster Services Technology will be an in class presentation of the class that are traditionally offered online. This is an opportunity for individuals to take the course in person with an instructor in the room and also at a faster pace. The online webinars are scheduled for two hours per session and the in person course allows the each session to be one hour. This course concludes the segments with 5-7.   |
| ERV Rodeo                                 | Take your ERV skills to the next level with the ERV Rodeo and test your ERV skills in our 2017 Challenge Course. Identify someone to team with and get ready for some fun. The ERV Rodeo will include an ERV driving obstacle course.   |

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| <p>ERV: Ready, Set, Roll</p>                   | <p>As a prospective ERV driver, you must be aware that there are a number of requirements. It is your responsibility to make sure these are taken care of (some are actually done by staff), but you need to make sure your records are accurate. The requirements are listed below with some guidance to help you. You must be able to show your driver's license before you can take the road test and have completed the Defensive Driving course. The other requirements can be done either before the class or after, but you cannot be authorized until all are completed.</p> <p>The ERV: Ready, Set, Roll course is done in three parts: Self-study, Vehicle Orientation (classroom), and Road Test. You must: Be 21 years of age; Have a valid driver's license; Have completed the online Safe Food Handling course. Have completed the Defensive Driving course Current certifications in First Aid and CPR<br/>     •Must be on your Red Cross training record. Also, there are a number of physical capacity requirements for Feeding staff, including ERV drivers. ERV drivers don't just drive, so it is important that you are able to load, feed, clean, etc. Please be honest in your self- assessment regarding your capacity to perform these tasks. I can speak from personal experience that these are not unusual expectations for ERV drivers. If you cannot perform these activities, you may not want to take the course. Physical capacity Lift/carry 50 lbs multiple times per shift • Work in extreme heat and/or humidity Stand for 2 hr periods • Work outdoors in inclement weather; Sit for 2 hr periods • Work in extreme cold Walk on uneven terrain • Able to step up/down 18 inches Walk for 2 miles during a shift • Speak clearly on phone and in person Bend or stoop multiple times during a shift • Drive in day time and at night Climb 2 or more flights of stairs</p> |
| <p>First Aid/CPR/AED Traditional Classroom</p> | <p>This is the traditional all-inclusive course for those who do not choose to do the blended learning version. The course teaches participants how to perform First Aid, CPR, and AED and will certify individuals for two years. Priority for this class will go to individuals who do not have "easy" access to PHSS training.</p>  |
| <p>Form 215 Workshop</p>                       | <p>In this workshop participants will learn about the use and function ICS Form 215 and will learn how to fill out the form and understand how that information is used to generate ICS Form 204 for the development of the Incident Action Plan (IAP). This form is routinely used in planning to determine appropriate staffing, equipment, and supply needs and is appropriate for supervisory personnel. It is recommend that individuals take ICS 100, 200, 700.</p>  |
| <p>FSI &amp; the 5266 Workshop</p>             | <p>What do you need to know to start an operation in terms of keeping track of financial and statistical information? What tools exist to help you collect the information? This workshop will explore the word of FSI and the 5266. Prerequisite: 5266 Fundamentals (online).</p>   |
| <p>Government Operations Fundamentals</p>      | <p>Government Operations Fundamentals is a basic level, instructor-led course that introduces the roles, responsibilities and tasks of the Red Cross Government Liaison. The course content is based on the Government Operations Handbook and other Disaster Services program guidance. Participants engage in activities and scenarios that Red Cross government liaisons typically encounter when representing the Red Cross throughout the disaster cycle. The course will also spend time discussing the Red Cross role in ESF6. Prerequisites: The following courses are highly recommended prior to attending or soon after completing Government Operations Fundamentals. 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| Integrated Care Condolence Teams  | The purpose of this course is to train current disaster responders in Casework and Recovery Planning, Disaster Health Services, Disaster Mental Health and Disaster Spiritual Care on the Integrated Care Condolence Team (ICCT) Standards and Procedures, and to provide guidance and best practices for working   |
| Introduction to the National Shelter System (NSS)                       | The purpose of this course is to train National Shelter System users on common readiness and operational tasks within the system.   |
| Logistics: An Overview  | Logistics: An Overview is an instructor-led, basic level course designed to give participants an overview of the Logistics group and the activities associated with it. Participants will learn about the skills, abilities and knowledge needed by Logistics workers and how they can become involved in their local chapter.  |
| Logistics: Facilities Management Simulation                             | The purpose of Facilities Management Fundamentals Simulation is to provide practice on identifying, evaluating, acquiring, repairing, and closing temporary buildings or locations used in support of disaster operations. Multiple job tools are used in the simulation. Prerequisites: Logistics: An Overview, Facilities Management Fundamentals   |
| Logistics: In-Kind Donations on Disaster Relief Operations Fundamentals | In-Kind Donations on Disaster Relief Operations Fundamentals is a basic level, instructor-led course that introduces the responsibilities and tasks of an In-Kind Donations responder working in Logistics operations on a disaster relief operation. Participants engage in activities and scenarios that Red Cross Supply responders typically encounter when working on a Red Cross disaster relief operation. Prerequisite: Logistics: An Overview  |
| Mass Care Management  | <p>Is an advanced level, instructor-led course designed to provide participants with skill practice to successfully complete Mass Care management tasks on a disaster relief operation and provide customer service and management support to assigned disaster workers. Current Mass Care leads and management workers or have lead mass care service delivery (sheltering, feeding, and/or bulk), disaster program managers, workers identified by the region as potential mass care managers, coordinators or leads, and regional logistics leads who have an interest in mass care. Signing up for the course does not guarantee that you will be attending this course. | Mass Casualty Disasters   | The purpose of this course is to prepare Red Cross employees and volunteers to provide a more effective initial response to a mass casualty disaster. The course combines a series of presentations and class discussions using real-world examples to explore the four types of mass casualty disasters and the planning and response role of the American Red Cross as part of an overall community response. This interactive learning experience culminates in a simulation of a mass casualty event where participants form teams, representing a Red Cross chapter, and must make decisions during the first 24 hours following the disaster event.   |

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| Oregon Capitol & Gold Man Tour                                   | Interested in getting a tour of the Oregon Capitol? Join us on this walking tour of the Oregon State Capitol and then weather permitting, you can choose if you would like to climb the 122 steps to the top of the Rotunda to see the Gold Man and an amazing view. The 122 stairs are up a spiral staircase. We'll gather at Willamette at 3:45 and walk across the street for our 4pm start time.   |
| Oregon State Hospital: Museum of Mental Health                   | OSH has opened the Museum of Mental Health and we invite you to join us on a special tour. &nbsp;Come learn about the history of the Oregon State Hospital and learn how mental health care has changed through the years. Individuals will be emailed directions for this tour one week in advance. &nbsp;This tour is open to everyone.  |
| Performance Evaluations Workshop                                 | This workshop will help the supervisor write meaningful performance evaluations that will help the worker as the progress as a disaster responder. Individuals will be taught a simple format and help them also learn where to find the competencies so they can write an appropriate review. This workshop is for both new and experienced supervisors.  |
| Pillowcase Project: Module 2                                     | The Pillowcase Project is a preparedness education program for children in grades 3-5, which teaches students about personal and family preparedness, local hazards, and basic coping skills. Generally given as a 60 minute presentation by Red Cross volunteers, the program leads students through a learn, practice, share framework to engage them in disaster preparedness. Students receive a sturdy pillowcase upon completion of the program. |
| Preparedness Leader  | To provide introduces participants to the Preparedness department, and explains how to present the preparedness message to adults. This course will also offer public speaking tips, and some updates to the materials for those volunteers who may already have experience with the Prepare! program.   |
| Psychological First Aid  | Psychological First Aid is a basic level, instructor-led course. It provides a framework for understanding the factors that affect stress responses in disaster relief workers and the clients they serve. Participants engage in practice exercises and complete a self-review questionnaire.   |
| Public Affairs: Telling the Red Cross Story & Interview Practice | Curious about Public Affairs? Want to learn more about sharing the Red Cross Story? Nervous about interviews and looking for tips? Curious about ways to volunteer with the Public Affairs Team? This workshop will help you tell the Red Cross Story and share tips to make your interviews go smooth.  |
| RC View Map Writing Fundamentals Day 1                           | RC View Map Writing Fundamentals is a 2-day instructor-led training course. Creating and editing maps is a critical skill for Disaster Cycle Services (DCS) and other Red Cross lines of business, and one that involves the execution of complex technical and analytical tasks. Instruction is reinforced with hands-on activities that allow participants to gain skill, practice and build maps that they will use in their regions.               |
| RC View Map Writing Fundamentals Day 2                           | RC View Map Writing Fundamentals is a 2-day instructor-led training course. 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| Restoring Family Links Casework          | American Red Cross caseworkers at local chapters around the U.S. help families locate missing relatives by working with our partners the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) and Red Cross and Red Crescent organizations in nearly every country around the world. Once a family member is found, the Red Cross helps them reconnect through written messages or by phone. Messages can be very brief, but the three short words I am alive may be all that is needed to ease the minds of distraught relatives half a world away. Red Cross messages can also be exchanged between families and their loved ones in refugee camps and detention centers to allow them to keep in contact and share family news. |
| SAF Reconnection Workshop                | The American Red Cross has developed the Reconnection Workshops. This program for service members, veterans and their families is meant to assist them in transitioning back to life at home after deployments and civilian life. This is a free and confidential program to help those facing challenges in returning to family life, their jobs, and living again in their community. Modules are offered in small groups and participants can choose from a selection of course topics that interest them. This course is limited to SAF Staff (volunteered and paid and is also open to individuals who are veterans.   |
| Shelter Management                       | The purpose of this course is to prepare participants to perform the roles, responsibilities and tasks of a shelter manager in a Red Cross shelter. Red Cross Employees and Volunteers; Disaster Frontline Supervisor; Simulation; Shelter Fundamentals; Basic Food Safety  |
| Shelter Simulation                       | The purpose of this simulation is to enable participants to simulate roles and gain sheltering experience using the content presented in the Shelter Fundamentals course. Participants need to take Shelter Fundamentals online previous to the class   |
| Sheltering with Confidence               | To help volunteers interested in sheltering gain a greater understanding of the forms used in Mass Care, the registration process, dorm layout, set-up and take down so you can build your competence and confidence in your own ability to work in a shelter, supervise a shelter, and/or manage a shelter. The course uses the Sheltering Handbook as its guide in a fun and interactive workshop that will help you gain greater understanding of the sheltering activity. This course also contains a segment on access and functional needs in a shelter.  |
| Staff Wellness Fundamentals              | This course is designed to introduce the Staff Wellness Standards and Procedures and to prepare Staff Wellness Health Reviewers and responders to accomplish Staff Wellness tasks.  |
| Supply Fundamentals                      | Supply Fundamentals is a basic level, instructor-led course that introduces the responsibilities and tasks of a Supply responder working in Logistics operations. Participants engage in activities and scenarios that Red Cross Supply responders typically encounter when working on a Red Cross disaster relief operation.   |
| Supporting Volunteers and Managing Teams | This course is designed to benefit those who are new to working with volunteers as well as those who have previous experience. It will present opportunities to raise your self-awareness about what you are doing well, as well as identify the positive changes you can make to enhance your success as a supervisor of volunteers.   |

The ECC serves a multi-agency communication hub and ensures that all participating response agencies are coordinated. | VIP Center Training  | <p>We're looking for fantastic volunteers (Youth; Adult) who want to join the exciting, new VIP Team and help grow our volunteer base. The VIP Center uses a network of volunteers across the country trained to help potential new volunteers navigate our volunteer intake process in a quick, fun and engaging way. Anyone interested is becoming a VIP volunteer and transforming the volunteer experience is welcome to join.
