Adult CPR/AED/ First Aid

Description: This course teaches participants how to perform CPR, AED, First Aid and will certify individuals for two years.

Basic Instructor Specialty Training

Description: This is an instructor led course designed to prepare disaster instructor candidates to teach basic level disaster courses. It is required for all potential instructors. In this course, participants will have an opportunity to practice teaching using disaster materials.

Care Assistance Skills Test

Description: This is designed to train disaster responders and partners to assist people with Disabilities and other Access and Functional Needs with the basic Activities of Daily Living, i.e. Mobility Assistance, Transferring Assistance, Feeding Assistance and Observation, so they can access and utilize Red Cross services offered in Shelters, Evacuation Centers and other Red Cross facilities.

Client Casework Workshop

Description: In this workshop we will provide role playing opportunities for caseworkers to practice their interviewing techniques, document casework, develop narratives, make appropriate referrals, and build a client recovery plan. This workshop is intended for anyone with client contact, specifically those involved in client recovery.

Collaborating Essentials

Description: This is a basic level, instructor-led course designed to promote and support collaboration at the Red Cross. Participants will engage in discussions and scenarios to determine the different skills and behaviors required for building and maintaining internal and external relationships.

Concept of Operations

Description: This workshop will explore the Disaster Cycle Services Concept of Operations which was published November 2014. As part of that discussion we will delve into further detail on ICS, incident action planning, and situation reporting. The entire workshop will offer an insight into how the meetings/reporting/products are developed and distributed on a disaster.

DAT Extravaganza

Description: This workshop will help participants to better understand the standard procedures and processes of a typical DAT Response. The workshop will review forms, assistance, and DAT supplies that DAT responders will use during a DAT response.

Disaster Frontline Supervisor

Description: This is an instructor-led, basic level course. The Disaster Frontline Supervisor Handbook provides disaster relief operations supervisors with tools that support their success. The handbook is for use on operations and in the classroom. You will receive a link to the handbook to use in the course.

Disaster Mental Health

Description: This is a basic level, instructor-led course that introduces the key concepts, knowledge and skills required of a Red Cross Disaster Mental Health (DMH) responder with a current license to practice mental health.

Disaster Public Affairs: National Relief Operation

Description: Disaster Public Affairs for National Relief Operations is a basic level course that explores how public affairs workers tell the Red Cross disaster relief story, principles for initiating and maintaining a public affairs response and key disaster messages. The course is designed for individuals who will serve as service associates, supervisors or managers in the Public Affairs activity on national relief operations.

Disaster Spiritual Care Information Session

Description: This information session is designed to present the Disaster Spiritual Care function to the disaster cycle services workforce.

Disaster Spiritual Care

Description: Trains clergy volunteers to work directly with disaster clients and families. Trains volunteers to assess the client's spiritual needs and provide direct spiritual care support and mitigate acute distress. This volunteer is part of the (ICCT) Integrated Care and Condolence Team (HS, DMH, CC, Disaster Spiritual Care).

Diversity Awareness

Description: Become more aware of people and cultures all around us and learn how to work better with people from diverse backgrounds. This (3) hour session will provide you with skills and knowledge to better understand LA's most vulnerable communities. In this training we will explore PrepareSoCal target groups, their specific needs, and ways to communicate more effectively.

Facilitating Leadership Skills for Mobilizing the Community

Description: Facilitative Leadership Skills for Mobilizing the Community is an instructor-led professional development course. It discusses what is meant by the term facilitative leadership in the Red Cross context, as well as the challenges associated with being a facilitative leader. Participants examine some of the theories and practices relevant to facilitation and then apply them to situations in which they are asked to mobilize the community. Role plays that center around working with stakeholders and partners give participants a chance to apply models for interest-based problem solving and intervention.

Fundamentals of Disaster Assessment

Description: This is a blended learning, basic level course consisting of an online and instructor-led component. Part one, the online component, (on EMBARC) provides an overview of the Disaster Assessment activity and its related tasks. Part two, the instructor-led component, reinforces and builds upon content presented in the online component while providing participants with the opportunity to apply their knowledge and develop skills in Disaster Assessment through applied learning activities.

Government Operations Fundamentals

Description: This is a basic level, instructor-led course that introduces the roles, responsibilities and tasks of the Red Cross government liaison. Participants engage in activities and scenarios that Red Cross government liaisons typically encounter when representing the Red Cross throughout the disaster cycle.

Prerequisites:

Disaster Cycle Services Overview (online via EMBARC)

Home Fire Campaign

Description: This course trains participants in a national effort to reduce home fire fatalities by ensuring families have working smoke detectors, providing them with safety information, and helping them make an evacuation plan. We will train you to fulfill any of the three roles on a team- educator, documenter, or installer.

ICS 100 Introduction to Incident Command System

Description: IS 100, Introduction to the Incident Command System, introduces the Incident Command System (ICS) and provides the foundation for higher level ICS training. This course describes the history, features and principles, and organizational structure of the Incident Command System.

ICS 700 National Incident Management System: An Introduction

Description: This course introduces and overviews the National Incident Management System (NIMS). NIMS provides a consistent nationwide template to enable all government, private-sector, and nongovernmental organizations to work together during domestic incidents.

In-Kind Donations on Disaster Relief Operations Fundamentals

Description: This course introduces the responsibilities and tasks of an In-Kind Donations responder working in Logistics operations on a disaster relief operation. Participants engage in activities and scenarios that Red Cross responders typically encounter when working on a Red Cross disaster relief operation.

Integrated Care Condolence Team

Description: Trains current disaster responders in Casework and Recovery Planning, Disaster Health Services, Disaster Mental Health and Disaster Spiritual Care on the Integrated Care Condolence Team (ICCT) Standards and Procedures, and to provide guidance and best practices for working in an integrated care.

Prerequisites:

- Active DMH or Spiritual Care volunteer

International Humanitarian Law

Description: International humanitarian law (IHL) is a set of rules that restrict the means and methods of warfare while protecting civilians, prisoners of war and wounded soldiers. This course addresses key global humanitarian issues during times of armed conflict.

Logistics Overview

Description: This course is designed to give participants an overview of the Logistics group and the activities associated with it. Participants will learn about the skills, abilities and knowledge needed by Logistics workers and how they can become involved in their local chapter.

Prerequisites:

Disaster Cycle Services Overview (online via EMBARC)

Mass Care Management

Description: This is an advanced level, instructor-led course designed to provide participants with skill practice to successfully complete Mass Care management tasks on a disaster relief operation and provide customer service and management support to assigned disaster workers.

Media Training

Description: Our social engagement team operates under one overarching philosophy: that we want to empower social media communities to execute the mission of the American Red Cross online. We want to provide valuable user-focused news and tools to help people: - Get help or give help in emergencies - Donate blood and get others to donate - Take health and safety courses and get others to enroll - Get prepared for disasters and encourage others to do so.

Pillowcase Presenter Training

Description: This 4 hour training will teach you to give the 60 minute presentation that teaches emergency preparedness to children in grades 3 thru 5 (ages 8-11) in school and other classroom settings. This highly interactive presentation addresses home fire safety, local natural hazards, psycho-social coping skills, and household preparedness steps like making a plan and a kit.

Preparedness Education (PE) Presenter Training

Description: This 4-hour training will teach you give the 60 minute PrepareU Disaster Preparedness Presentation the Red Cross for adults and youth including 3 steps for preparedness, and presentation techniques. You will learn about the preparedness messaging, how to present our preparedness presentation. Participants will have the opportunity to teach back what they have learned and receive feedback on presentation skills.

Psychological First Aid

Description: This course provides a framework for understanding the factors that affect stress responses in disaster relief workers and the clients they serve. Participants engage in practice exercises and complete a self-review questionnaire.

RC View

Description: This is a presentation designed to introduce attendees to the features and functions of Red Cross View and the situational awareness it provides to disaster workers on DAT calls and DROs.

Restoring Family Links

Description: Enables caseworkers to more effectively deliver international Restoring Family Links casework services to clients. The training explains how Restoring Family Links services are global in scope and a core activity of the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement.

Service Delivery Site Management

Description: This is an instructor-led, advanced level course designed to give the participants the knowledge and skills needed to run a service delivery site during a disaster. This course includes lecture, table group exercises, and a half-day simulation of a disaster to test the participants' knowledge of opening, maintaining and closing a service delivery site.

- Concept of Operations Overview (online)

Shelter Fundamentals

Description: Shelter Fundamentals is a basic level course that introduces the guidelines and procedures for setting up, running and closing a shelter during a disaster. Referencing shelter checklists, participants will work on a case study that takes them through four of the six phases of the Sheltering Cycle: Opening, Organizing, Operating and Closing.

Prerequisites:

Disaster Cycle Services Overview (online via EMBARC)

Shelter Fundamentals Exercise

Description: This course allows participants to practice the knowledge they gained in the Shelter Fundamentals course. It is a "hands-on" skills-based exercise. Participants work in teams that rotate through four skills stations based on the four categories of shelter workers presented in the course: Dormitory, Registration, Information, and Feeding.

Prerequisites:

Shelter Fundamentals (in person or online via EMBARC)

Situational Awareness in Disaster Response: Overview

Description: Situational Awareness in Disaster Response: An Overview introduces the concepts of situational awareness and common operating picture, and how they affect decision-making during a disaster response. The course provides an overview of how responders can contribute to and maintain situational awareness, and is recommended for cross-training of disaster responders in any activity.

Prerequisites:

- ICS 100 (in person or online through https://training.fema.gov/is/)
- Concept of Operations

Situational Awareness in Disaster Response: Induction to the Situation Unit

Description: Situational Awareness in Disaster Response: Induction to the Situation Unit is the unit-specific training for Situation Unit trainees and/or volunteers interested learning about the Situation Unit activity within the Information & Planning Section. This course is also recommended for those interested in Disaster Assessment, Geospatial Information Systems (GIS), and other units within the Planning Section.

Prerequisites:

- Concept of Operations

Social Media Training

Description: Our social engagement team operates under one overarching philosophy: that we want to empower social media communities to execute the mission of the American Red Cross online. We want to provide valuable user-focused news and tools to help people:

- Donate blood and get others to donate
- Take health and safety courses and get others to enroll
- Get prepared for disasters and encourage others to do so

Supervising Volunteers

Description: This course reviews best practices when supervising volunteers.

Supporting Volunteers and Managing Teams

Description: This course is designed to benefit those who are new to working with volunteers as well as those who have previous experience. It will present opportunities to raise your self-awareness about what you are doing well, as well as identify the positive changes you can make to enhance your success as a supervisor of volunteers.

Supply Fundamentals on DRO

Description: This course introduces the responsibilities and tasks of a Supply responder working in Logistics operations. Participants engage in activities and scenarios that Red Cross Supply workers typically encounter when working on a Red Cross disaster operation.

Prerequisites:

- Disaster Cycle Services Overview (online via EMBARC)
- Logistics Overview (online via EMBARC)

Tribal Relations

Description: Effective partnerships form and evolve because the individual partners have an understanding, appreciation, and respect for one another that they acquire through education and life experience. This workshop is designed to provide the basic knowledge to build effective partnerships with tribal governments and to work in concert with them on disaster response. This workshop is recommended for all Red Cross responders.
